Dear Parent/Carer,

I hope you and your family had a pleasant Bank Holiday weekend.

This week and next week I am leading an assembly about protected characteristics and the Equality Act.

I begin by asking students what prejudice means and whether a local gym saying Mr Kelly could not use their premises because he is old, would be breaking the law. I then explain the eight protected characteristics and ask students to consider examples applying to race, religion, gender-reassignment, pay based on gender and so on. This assembly isn't just about developing students' knowledge and understanding of a key piece of UK legislation; I go on to address hate crime and the need for us all to treat each other with respect and never say anything that is upsetting to others, particularly with reference to the eight protected characteristics, for example, addressing the fact that racist and homophobic comments are unacceptable at school, in the workplace and anywhere. My conclusion is: treat other people the way you would like to be treated, be kind and stay within the law, including when using social media. I know you will actively support these important messages, as parents/carers.

Another important message we communicate as a school concerns violence. We are currently giving the following reminders to students: "If you feel wound up because someone is annoying you, let a member of staff know. If you are aware there is tension between students, let a member of staff know. Students who choose to fight are making the wrong choices and will face serious sanctions. These will be recorded on their school record". Thankfully, the overwhelming majority of students at HLS make the right choices when it comes to fighting and the use of violence. They are kind, caring and quick to let us know if they have a concern.

Last Friday morning the whole of our school gathered for our first whole-school photograph since 1989 (which was the School's 50th anniversary). Because we are a very large school in terms of our number of students and staff, it took a while to get the photograph completed and the students had to wait patiently in position on the tiered stands. I'd like to thank Mrs Woodall for her excellent planning and organisation of this whole-school photograph and the students and staff for their patience. The company organising the event commented on the excellent behaviour of the students and tight organisation. It says a huge amount about our school that things ran so smoothly. We are all looking forward to seeing the final photograph!
