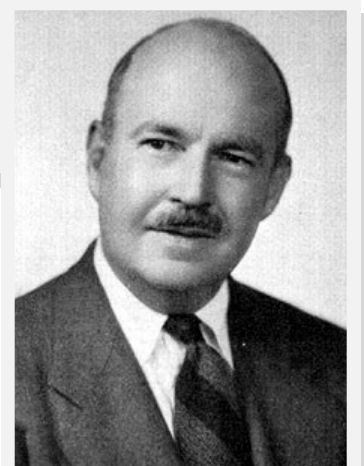
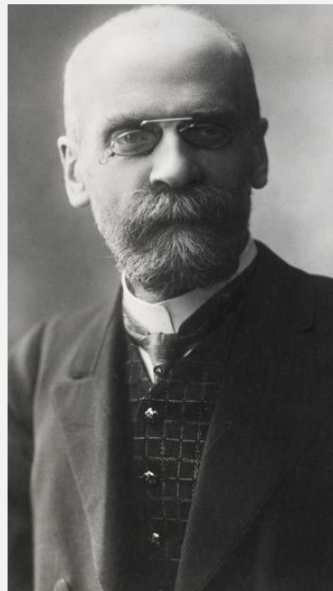
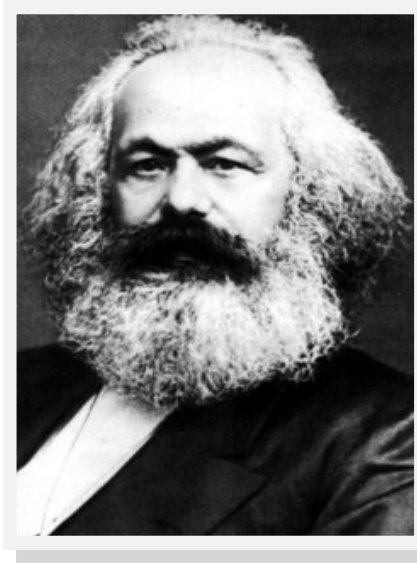

An interest in social issues: You need to have an awareness of what is happening socially and politically in the UK.

A willingness to debate and engage in group work: Good quality discussion helps to improve your evaluation skills as well as developing confidence in your own ability to express yourself.

Organisation: You will need to get a ring-binder that you will bring to all lessons. It is essential that you keep your file organised with dividers and copy up (and add to) notes from class. Regular folder checks will be carried

Curiosity and Critical Thinking: You must have an open mind and be able to evaluate different points of views and theories. You must be able to approach subjects without any bias or preconceptions. You should be prepared to question everything and come up with hypotheses that you will test.

What makes a successful sociology student?

Attendance: You are required to attend all of your classes. If you know you are going to be absent, you must arrange this beforehand and find out what work you will be missing. You are expected to attend all revision sessions.

Independent study: You will be expected to spend around 3 hours per week on homework and independent research. When not formally set homework you should still be reading articles, expanding your class notes and planning exam answers.
