## What is chronology?

In order to know where you are going you need to know where you have been.

In order to make sense of any time or event we need to do that in relation to other times and events.

Chronology is a word meaning 'the study of time'. It comes from the Greek words *chronos* (time) and *logos* (word). The adjective is *chronological*. Putting events in chronological order means: listing them in the order in which they happened

## How do we put time into chronological order?

*Time is divided into two distinct eras known as BCE (before common era) and CE (common era). The following timeline shows how time works in these two eras.*

< Before Common Era - BCE/BC >					< Common Era - CE/AD >			
3000	300	3	2	1	1	2	500	2020
BCE	BCE	BCE	BCE	BCE	CE	CE	CE	CE

*Dates in BCE (BC) get larger the further back in history you go and smaller towards 1BCE.*

*Dates in CE (AD) get smaller the further back in history towards 1CE/AD and larger towards the future (e.g 2018).*
