tackle bullying in schools and communities.

• Working closely with other Youth Board members and be a national voice for all antibullying ambassadors.

• Support The Diana Award as an organisation, helping them to keep up-to-date with current trends and issues that young people are facing in and out of school.

• Having the opportunity to travel and speak at various events. For example, visit Facebook's headquarters in Dublin and Google's hub in London, attend a debate at the European Parliament in Brussels and participate in a meeting at 10 Downing Street to help co-ordinate National Anti-Bullying Week.

• Interviewing very special guests.

 Helping recruit new staff members and adapt or change workshops and programmes to better support others.

• Being featured on The Diana Awards website, in newspapers, on the radio or even TV.

The School's Student Leadership Co-ordinator, Miss Arshad, said: ``I'm absolutely delighted for Tia. She is a very ambitious, compassionate and positively headstrong young lady who always stands up for what is right and supports her peers tirelessly."

Although Tia will lead on tackling racism and discrimination, she endeavours to raise awareness of all types of bullying — both within Higham Lane School and on a national level.

Tia pledges to work closely with her fellow Anti-Bullying Ambassadors to:

• Create awareness of racism and discrimination through drama performances which portray common stereotyping and discrimination which people face and accept on a daily basis. She would like to work with local youth clubs and organisations to put this together. In addition, she would like to organise cultural events and festivals at our School.

• Explicitly create an ethos and culture which emphasises care, kindness and respect in every interaction. Moreover, she aims to empower students and staff with kind words and supportive gestures so they can be the best possible versions of themselves.

• Specifically focus on developing a knowledge-rich curriculum whereby students are educated on citizenship values and have the opportunity to learn about different cultures and communities more explicitly. Sometimes, teachers are so focussed on telling students how to behave towards others and getting them to reflect on the impact their attitude and behaviour has on people, without actually giving them the opportunities to learn about different people, their values and ideologies, in meaningful ways.

• Give students the opportunity to talk about their heritage and background in a safe space as well as learn about others. It is important students are given similar messages in each lesson so that it becomes embedded into daily practice.

 Clarify misconceptions and establish clearer boundaries around what is acceptable and what isn't: sometimes bullying can be so subtle (it involves low level behaviours), it goes undetected or is labelled as 'harmless banter'. It becomes 'normalised' or escalates further down the line. In order for the School to create an environment where students speak-up, this needs to start by educating students. Higham Lane is very proud of Tia and wish her all the very best during the The Diana Award National Youth Board assignment and with her invaluable Anti-Bullying work within School alongside fellow Ambassadors.

How are we doing and where are we heading?

IN A recent address to staff regarding the future of Higham Lane School, Headteacher, Phil Kelly, answered the big questions on everyone's lips: How are we doing and where are we heading? Mr Kelly was pleased to report the School is doing really well! With a Progress 8 score of 0.46, it places Higham Lane among the top 15% of schools nationally and eighth out of 55 schools with similar intakes nationally. In addition, the Sixth Form chalked-up an impressive first set of A-level results in 2018 while its intake is growing yearon-year.

Attendance is significantly above the national average with persistent absence well below the nationwide figure. An effective Behaviour for Learning Policy is in place with very low numbers of fixed term exclusions and zero permanent exclusions, while the School provides effective internal sanctions by way of internal exclusion, inclusion and detentions, and provides active on-call support every lesson.

Higham Lane also has an excellent reputation for work with Children Looked After and students with special needs and disabilities.

It is highly-regarded by parents/carers, prospective parents and the local community, resulting in every year group being over-subscribed.

The School offers excellent Continued

Professional Development to its staff, complemented by bespoke career stage training programmes for improving and outstanding teachers.

Higham Lane is also an Aspiring Teaching School, providing expertise in teacher training, and has a partnership with 11 partner schools across both primary and secondary phases in collaboration with the University of Warwick.

Looking forward, the School is working on a curriculum review, further enhancing staff wellbeing and making improvements to its facilities and site.

However, schools in England are facing the first real-term cuts to their funding since the mid-1990s, a leading think tank has warned. Spending per student is to fall 6.5% by 2019-20, according to the Institute for Fiscal Studies (IFS). School funding must be increased by £5.7 billion if every child is to receive the education they deserve, says a new report from the Association of School and College Leaders.

Higham Lane is proud of its excellent curriculum but realises that changes need to be made to the taught curriculum and extra-curricular opportunities to cater for the needs and interests of all learners in an ever-changing student intake. Changes being considered include courses for students struggling with GCSEs and more focus on `soft skills' teamwork, problem solving, interpersonal skills and resilience.

In a nutshell, the 2020 Vision for Higham Lane School is to continue to improve and make it an even greater place to be for students and staff alike.



If you had to choose between buying sanitary wear or eating, which would you choose?

In August 2017, Plan International UK conducted a study among 14-21 year old girls and young women which found that:

More than a quarter of girls said they used a sanitary product for longer than its intended use because they couldn't afford a fresh one.

1 in 10 have been UNABLE TO AFFORD sanitary protection 1 in 7 have struggled to afford sanitary protection 48% of girls in the UK are embarrassed by their periods

49% have missed an entire day of school because of their period; of which 59% have made up a lie or an alternate excuse.

Almost one-third (32%) have missed more than one day of school because of their period.

Whether it's period poverty, not being able to ask at home, or just being caught short, we want to let girls keep their dignity.

The Red Box is housed in the Library office, where girls can collect items from 8am until 4.15pm Monday, Tuesday, Thursday & Friday and 8am-3.30pm on a Wednesday. We hope that students will not feel embarrassed to ask for the Red Box. This is a free and confidential service and staff will be discreet when students ask to use it.

If students aren't comfortable asking the librarians out loud, then a written note can be discreetly passed.

We will also be looking for donations for the other Red Boxes, which are currently located in schools and community areas within the borough, so any items you can donate would be greatly received by the librarians or myself, who will then forward the items to the Red Box Project.

Year 11 — Your exams are almost here . . !

THERE'S not long left now until your exams. Have you started revising? The answer should be YES!

If you haven't already done so, you need to start revising NOW – <u>DO NOT LEAVE</u> IT TOO LATE!

Planning ahead will help you achieve your goal.

When are your exams?

• Start by making a list showing the order they come in so you can plan your revision accordingly. If Maths is one of your first exams, make sure it is one of the first subjects you start revising.

• Prioritise the subjects that may need more attention than others.

• Ask for help and attend any catch-up classes that are on offer. You cannot revise something that you do not fully understand.

Make a space for yourself

- Revise somewhere that you won't be distracted.
- Make it comfortable.

• Keep the space tidy and when you take a break, move away from your revision space.

• Turn your phone off while you revise – no social networking! Leave it in another room if you can't trust yourself.

• If you feel silence would help you work better, let others around you know that you are working.

• If silence doesn't help, try playing background music instead, or use some headphones to reduce the risk of outside distractions.

Technique

By now, you should know what revision techniques are out there. The important thing to remember is to use whatever works best for you, regardless of what works best for your friends. These are **YOUR** exams!

Think about using the following:-

- Summary notes.
- Reading out loud when memorising.

- Creating posters and mind maps.
- Highlighting key words for each topic.
- Making revision cards.
- Looking at past exam papers.
- Using different colours (paper/pens).

• Test yourself regularly. This is important. It will help to identify your weak areas and build your confidence as your strengths increase.

Do not work all the time!

It is important to work for around 40 minutes before taking a short break. If you work for too long in one go, your brain will get tired, making it harder to remember all the information.

Eat and sleep well

• Do something in your break. You could call a friend or have something to eat. Use these things as a reward for your hard work before moving on to another topic.

• Get into good habits – go to bed at a reasonable time and make sure you always have breakfast. You cannot

function properly if you haven't had enough food or sleep so make sure you take it seriously.

• Make sure you stay hydrated and drink plenty of water. Stay away from energy drinks. They can give you a boost to begin with, but then make you tired.

• Take time to relax.

Think about yourself

• Focus on what you need to do and not what other people are doing. Everyone is different and you must do what is best for YOU.


• Don't be afraid to ask for help. See your teachers, Progress Leader, Learning Mentor, parents/carers or friends.


• Remember that this period of hard work and stress will not last forever!

Mr Sayed bowled over with cricketing award!

AN OUTSTANDING all-round cricketing display for his team has earned Higham Lane School Science teacher, Ahsan Sayed, top accolade in the 2018 Gunn & Moore-sponsored Cricketer Village Cup awards.

In January, GM hosted the CVC `Performance of the Round' competition when Mr Sayed was vying with three other nominees for the prestigious `Performance of the Tournament' title. Mr Sayed was delighted when he was announced as the recipient, courtesy of a truly talismanic display in Fillongley's round five victory over Hagley.

The Worcestershire side batted first and, thanks to a century from one of their openers, were off to a flying start. However, fine bowling figures of 4-45 from Mr Sayed pegged back their innings to 279 all out.

``We were behind from ball one. Their

opener was fantastic for his 121 but he ended up playing a couple of false shots, got out and then I had my way with them," reflected Mr Sayed.

He followed up his bowling stint by hitting an unbeaten 97 to help his North Warwickshire outfit to chase down the 280 target in the final over of the game, to which he humbly added: ``I don't think I'll play a better knock than that!'' As winner of the `Performance of the Tournament' award, Mr Sayed received a bag of GM kit and a hand-made cricket bat.

The awards were presented by Tom Coffey, GM's Marketing Manager, along with Glamorgan's South African allrounder and GM ambassador, Craig Meschede.

Looking forward to the 2019 Cricketer Village Cup, which GM is once again sponsoring, Mr Sayed said: ``It's a fantastic tournament which is great for a small club like ours. We're away from any big cricket clubs and it's hard to attract players, so this is a really important way of bringing players to the club. It gets our name in the papers so we can attract local talent."

The four nominees were also treated to a tour of the company's Nottingham factory, giving them the opportunity to see how GM's bats are hand-crafted on site, and the players also received a commemorative bat with details of their performances etched onto the face. Mr Sayed concluded: ``I want to thank Gunn & Moore for the fantastic tour. It's been eye-opening to find out how we get from the point where the wood is sourced to the point where the bat is made, along with an inside look at all the fantastic people with all their great skills."

THE **Year 7** football squad players have continued their impressive start at Higham Lane School. The team has now played numerous league fixtures and friendly matches, meaning no less than 25 Year 7 students have represented the School this year!

The friendlies against Etone, on their Astroturf pitch, was an excellent chance for the boys to obtain match practice together during the winter period. Each time the boys were divided into seven-aside teams and played a number of games in very cold conditions. Overall, the boys enjoyed a great deal of success, winning several games. In the District League, they eventually finished top and progressed through to the league finals where they faced St Thomas More. Higham played superbly well, under the management of Mr Caputo, to win 3-1 and are now through to the County Cup semi-final against Kenilworth School.

The **Year 7 girls**' football team have, unfortunately, not experienced much game time this term as no fixtures could be arranged with other schools in the area. Hopefully, a number of friendly matches can be sorted for the summer term.

After winning the District five-a-side tournament, the girls qualified for February's West Midlands finals. In a very competitive tournament, the eightstrong squad played superbly well to win their first four group games against The Priory, Idsall, Telford Park and Thomas Estley.

In their final fixture they lost to Leasowes School, the eventual winners, but still progressed through to the semifinals. Unfortunately, the girls lost 2-1 to Sandwell Academy, which meant they finished fourth overall in the West Midlands area. An amazing achievement. Well done girls! After the **Year 8** football squad's success in the National Cup, they

continued to produce some excellent football to eventually finish top of the table and progress through to the league finals against Nicholas Chamberlaine and Kingsbury.

Nicholas Chamberlaine could only field six players so it was left to Higham Lane and Kingsbury to battle it out for honours. The boys played extremely well



against a very physical Kingsbury team but went down 6-3 in the end to finish league runners-up.

The **Year 9** football squad has experienced a mixed season, eventually finishing fourth in the league.
