

Marathon effort to raise money!

IN SEPTEMBER, I returned 'home' to compete in this year's Great North Run in Newcastle (see photographs).

I've wanted to complete this race since I was a 'bairn' (a child in Geordie dialect!), watching my dad run it in the 1980s and '90s. I've run alternative half marathons but they didn't compare to running over the Tyne Bridge!

I finished in 1:28.32 — a personal best and 24 minutes behind Olympian Mo Farah. I even resisted the celebratory Alan Shearer-esque arm in the air as I crossed the line! I ran the GNR for `Tommy's', a children's charity who work to prevent one in four pregnancies ending in loss. 55,000 babies are born prematurely in the UK every year incomprehensible statistics in 2016 given advances in modern medicine.

In total, I raised £316 for an amazing charity which contributes to fund medical research into causes and prevention of miscarriage, premature birth and stillbirth.

I've enrolled on a 40-mile ultra marathon race around Coventry in April (because, why not?). This is part of my preparation for a 69-mile ultra marathon mixed terrain race I'm competing in to run from Carlisle Castle to Newcastle Quayside in June. A challenge intended to push me to an extreme and raise money for a worthwhile charity — Children With Cancer. MY NAME is Heather and I am a member of Hinckley Sea Cadets. In October, I was asked to attend a selection weekend at Leicester to try out for a chance to represent the area at the national Trafalgar Day, in London, as part of the Guard of Honour.

After a weekend of drill and uniform inspection, four other cadets and me from my unit were selected to go.

On October 20, we travelled down to Whale Island, Portsmouth, to the naval base HMS Excellence, where we stayed on board HMS Bristol for three days.

During those three days we did more drill training and uniform and prepared for the following weekend's parade.

Even though it was a long and tiring four days, the end result was worth it. The Parade was a once in a lifetime opportunity and our Guard looked very smart when marching down The Mall all in time with the band, with thousands of people watching us and cheering us on. It was the best feeling!

As part of their Independent Learning Units, each student was asked to design and make something which could be associated with The Bard.


They achieved this via a wide array of ideas, including delightful drawings, fantastic friezes and magnificent models of the Globe Theatre made out of cardboard and felt.




Open house at Sixth Form!

News from the Science Department

It really is rocket science!

AT THE end of the summer term, a group of Year 7 and Year 8 space biologists took part in an outer space investigation supported by The Royal Horticultural Society and UK Space Agency.

In September 2015, 2kg of rocket seeds were flow to the International Space Centre aboard Soyuz 44S. The seeds were held in microgravity for six months with British ESA astronaut, Tim Peake, taking charge of them while on the ISS for his well-publicised four-month Principia mission.

The seeds returned to Earth in April 2016, and Higham Lane School received 100. Fifteen space biologists planted the seeds alongside others which had not been into space to see if there were any differences in growth.

No-one at Higham Lane knew which seeds had been into space and which had remained on Earth.

We uploaded our results to the national database and we have now found that seeds that have been in space grow

almost as well as those that have stayed on Earth.

The national results found that, on average, 4% more Earth seeds germinated ten days after they were planted. Just over 70% of the plants grown from Earth seeds were alive after 17 days - just slightly more than the plants grown from space seeds - just over 66%.

These results indicated that the space seeds grew less well than seeds that had remained on Earth, but only slightly. In conclusion there has been a slight biological effect on the seeds. Dr Hayley Jones, of the RHS, concludes

that rocket seeds - and probably other kinds of seeds that can be grown to provide food for astronauts during long duration missions are resilient to the traumas of spaceflight.

Ryan (9H3), who took part in the national experiment, commented: ``I decided to be part of the HLS space biologist team because the topic of space has always been one of my

favourite sections in science. To be able to work with items that have been to space fascinated me and I chose to join.

"This activity was an amazing experience and even showed us that it is possible to grow plants that have been to space, which we could use in the future if we were to move to another planet. If another activity similar to this was available in the future, I would definitely sign up to be part of it."

More than 320,000 individual measurements were collected - making the experiment scientifically robust and one of the most detailed of its kind ever carried out. The results will be useful to scientists trying to find ways of growing food in space.

Thank you to all the space biologists for your time carrying out the investigation and collecting results. Also a big thank you to Mrs Sullivan and Dr Smith, the science lab technicians, who put an enormous amount of their own time into this national investigation.

Create your own eggshell crystals

YOU WILL NEED:

Clean eggshells

Water

• A variety of soluble solids: table salt, rock salt, sugar, baking powder, Epsom salts, sea salt, or cream of tartar

- Small heat proof containers (coffee cups work well)
- Spoons
- Food colouring
- Egg cartons

WHAT TO DO:

1. Crack the eggs for this project as close to the narrow end as possible. This preserves more egg to use as a container for the solution.

 Clean the eggshells using hot water.
Use an egg carton lined with greaseproof paper to hold the eggs upright.

4. Use a saucepan to heat the water to boiling.

5. Pour half a cup to a cup of water into your heatproof container. If you poured half a cup of water into the container, add about a ¼ cup of solid to the water. Stir it until it dissolves. You wanted to add about half again the volume of the water as a solid to the mixture. When



the initial amount of solid is dissolved, continue adding small amounts of the solid until the water is saturated. Saturated simply means the water has absorbed all it is able to absorb and any solid you add will not dissolve. **6.** Add food colouring.

7. Carefully pour your solution into the eggshell, filling it as full as possible without over-flowing it or causing it to tip.

Find a safe place to put your shells

while the water evaporates. Crystals will form inside the eggshells as the water evaporates over several days.

If you complete this experiment take a photo and show your science teacher to receive a merit. We can't wait to see your crystals.

IN KEEPNG with recent times, Higham Lane School chalked up an excellent set of GCSE examination results this year. When the 2016 results were announced on August 25, it was revealed that 82% of Year 11 students had achieved five or more A*-C grades, including English and Mathematics.

This gains Higham Lane the accolade of being the second highest achieving non-selective school in Warwickshire and puts us amongst the top 100 performing non-selective schools in England.

In English, a stunning 93% of students gained A*-C, with an excellent 85% obtaining this in Maths. An impressive 28% of the year group secured five or more grades A*/A grades. Among the School's top performers was Head Girl, Sharifa Sheikh, who achieved an A* in all 12 subjects which she studied! 
